Saving and Naming Your Questionnaire

Please follow the form detailed below exactly. Your questionnaire was downloaded to your computer as a Microsoft Word file (docx) with a generic name that identifies the office for which you are running. After you complete your questionnaire, but before submitting, you must save your questionnaire as a PDF file and give it a new name to which you will append your personal name and the election year as specified below.

General Form:

- If you were running for a suburban mayor’s office, your downloaded file (doc) name would be: Mayor_SUB_f
- You must save-as a PDF file (.pdf) and replace the “f” part of the downloaded file name with your last and first name and add the election year.
- Use capitals for the first letter of your last and first name and lowercase for the rest.

Specific Example:

- Suburban Mayor candidate Elizabeth Rias would rename the Mayor_SUB_f file to: Mayor_SUB_RiasElizabeth2019

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If you are familiar with file saving routines, you may skip the step-by-step instructions below.

Step-by-Step Instructions for saving as a PDF file and personalizing your questionnaire file name:

1. Open your completed questionnaire in your word processor.
2. From the FILE menu, select "Save a Copy" (or "Save As").
 - 2.1. In the dialogue box that appears, find the pull-down list that shows the file type. It will show .doc or .docx.
 - 2.2. Click on the small triangle within the file-type box and select the "PDF" (.pdf) option from the menu.
 - 2.3. BEFORE selecting the "save" or "export as" option (varies depending on your computer platform set-up), rename your file.
 - 2.4. You will see the generic questionnaire title in a fill-in box (e.g. Mayor_SUB_f) with the first word identifying the office for which you are a candidate and the second indicating the jurisdiction (in the example, Mayor, suburban) followed by an underscore and the letter "f."
 - 2.5. Click on the generic name field to highlight the name.
 - 2.6. Then, click just after the END of the generic title (so that the entire file title is no longer highlighted but the field is active).
 - 2.7. Backspace once to eliminate the "f."
 - 2.8. Type your last name then first name, using appropriate capitals and lower-case letters (no space necessary: e.g., JohnsonJuan).
 - 2.9. Add 2019 (the election year).
 - 2.10. **Your file name should look like this (but with your specific office and name):**

3. BEFORE SELECTING "Save" look to be sure you are saving the file to the location you want (if you need to change the location, click on the file path and navigate to the location you wish to save the file (e.g., your desktop, a specific folder, etc.))
4. Make sure you remember this location: this is the location you must navigate to when you attach your file to an e-mail and submit to the IVI-IPO.

22.	What experience have you had which will be most helpful to you in the office you seek? My experience as a community organizer in the 31st Ward and surrounding communities is what has prepared me most for the role of Alderman. I co-founded Hermosa Neighborhood Association to bring about positive change in the community, serving as the president and a board member from 2014 to 2018. During this time, the nonprofit held countless public events to help inform area residents, advocated for affordable housing in new developments, secured upgrades to vital local infrastructure, as well as cosponsoring the blocking of the expansion of ITW David Speer Academy. I have also served as an active member of the Local School Council (LSC) for William P. Nixon Elementary School in Hermosa since 2015. Through this role, I helped raise hundreds of thousands of dollars for school improvements and have seen first-hand how schools with large vulnerable populations are routinely targeted for divestment. Through this role, I have also advocated for Nixon directly to CPS officials and city leaders. I have also been an active member of The People’s Lobby (TPL) since 2015. Through TPL, I have been heavily involved in electoral reform, fighting for the Chicago Fair Elections Ordinance, which would match small donations to increase the viability of progressive candidates and increase voter participation. I am also a member of Reclaim Chicago, and have gained campaign experience by helping get progressive candidates elected through Reclaim Chicago. I also recently founded the 31st Ward Independent Political Organization in 2017.

(a) I believe that I should be endorsed over the other candidates because of my deep commitment to putting community first in the 31st Ward. I am the only candidate that is not accepting campaign donations from developers, and I am committed to earning my support. Alderman Milly Santiago has one of the lowest attendance rates to City Council meetings, and hasn't been the primary sponsor of a single ordinance. We have heard from many residents that her ward office is often unresponsive and unhelpful, and that they are ready for change in the ward. Felix Cardona, Jr., who works for the Cook County Assessor, has had multiple investigations conducted against him due to influence-peddling involving tax appeals linked to Berrios's office. He is also running on a platform that includes closing public schools, something that I believe would only hurt our community. (b) The biggest goals that are most important to me personally are increasing affordable housing, supporting our neighborhood public schools, and raising up racial integration and LGBTQ+ rights.
28.	What is your campaign budget and (b) how much have you raised to date? Our budget is \$100,000. So far, we have raised just over \$48,000 in cash and in-kind donations.

66.	What criteria do you or will you use in determining whether or not to grant a zoning change or variance? I would require any large developments to include a minimum of 20% affordable housing for anything with 10 units or more. I am also in favor of a community-led zoning process, where we get extensive feedback from the community before making any zoning changes or variances.
67.	How do you propose to replace property tax revenue for CPS and other taxing bodies that is lost to TIF development? TIFs do not reduce revenue that the government receives since property tax is a levy. However, TIFs reduce the tax base, which increases the effective property tax rate for the residents of Chicago. Eliminating TIFs would not increase revenue the government receives, but it would reduce property taxes. In order to recapture the revenue, City Council would have to increase the property tax levy equal to the amount of TIF revenue collected in prior years. Because it may be politically difficult for City Council to increase property taxes, I believe we should keep the TIFs as a revenue generator by declaring annual TIF-surpluses for the near majority of these funds. We can do this by analyzing and determining where new or rehab construction would occur even if the TIF were not created. The majority of the annual \$500 million in revenue should go to the City of Chicago and sister agencies such as CPS, which would likely get \$250 million annually. City Council should also evaluate earmarked

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projects and cancel ones that are not deemed essential and refund 100% of existing TIF reserves, currently estimated at nearly \$1 billion, to the pensions, including CPS's.
